Year in Review

Residential - More New Homes!



Pomontory – Construction at the City’s largest residential development continues at the Hilltop. The project offers single-family homes ranging in size from 2,035 to 3,295 square feet and include up to 6 bedrooms.



Bxby Ridge – Construction on the last of the 169 single-family homes on the west-side of Hathaway Avenue near Hill Street is nearing completion. These homes range in size from 2,100 to 2,600 square feet.



Traces – The finishing touches are being applied to the first of 18 single-family homes on the east side of Orizaba Avenue south of Hill Street. These homes include 4 or 5 bedrooms and are situated on lots 5,000 square feet and larger.



Del’s Homes – The second phase of the Del’s Homes development, consisting of four large-lot single-family dwellings, was completed on the east side of Orizaba Avenue north of 19th Street.



Molino Townhomes – 24 townhome-style condominium units will be constructed on the north side of Skyline Drive between Molino and Ohio Avenues. All units include 2,021 square feet of floor area and have private two-car garages.

Las Brisas Update

In February, the Los Angeles Community Design Center expects to begin construction on the much-anticipated revitalization of the Las Brisas neighborhood. The project is located on the west side of California Avenue north of Burnett Street and will include the rehabilitation of 92 apartments as well as a new community center and neighborhood park.



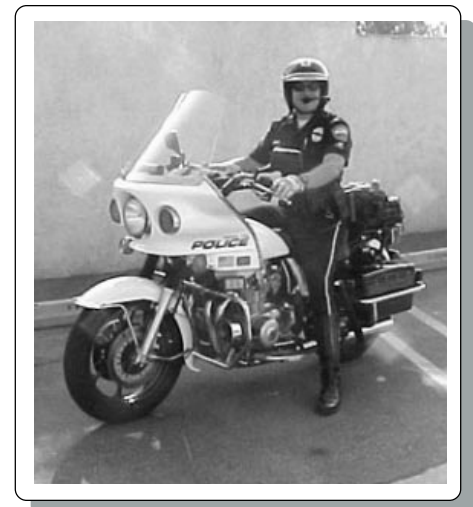
Police Department

Invites you to TAKE A WALK on the HILL. Enjoy the views and unique settings only Signal Hill can provide.

Grade Incline

- Green** 0 - 5% grade (wheelchair accessible)
- Yellow** 5% - 15% grade - Moderate steeple
- Red** 15% - 25% grade - Carth walkout

Distance Covered

Each * used on the map indicates a 1/16 mile increment. From your starting point, count the number of markers you will pass on your walk. Divide by 16 to find the number of miles. For example 16 markers / 16 = 1 mile. 8 markers / 16 = .5 mile, etc...

Topographic Lines

The white lines in the background show elevation changes. Each line represents a 10' grade change. Travel over 5 of these lines and you have climbed 50 feet. Pacific Coast Hwy is approx 200' above sea level, and the highest point on the Hill is 340'.

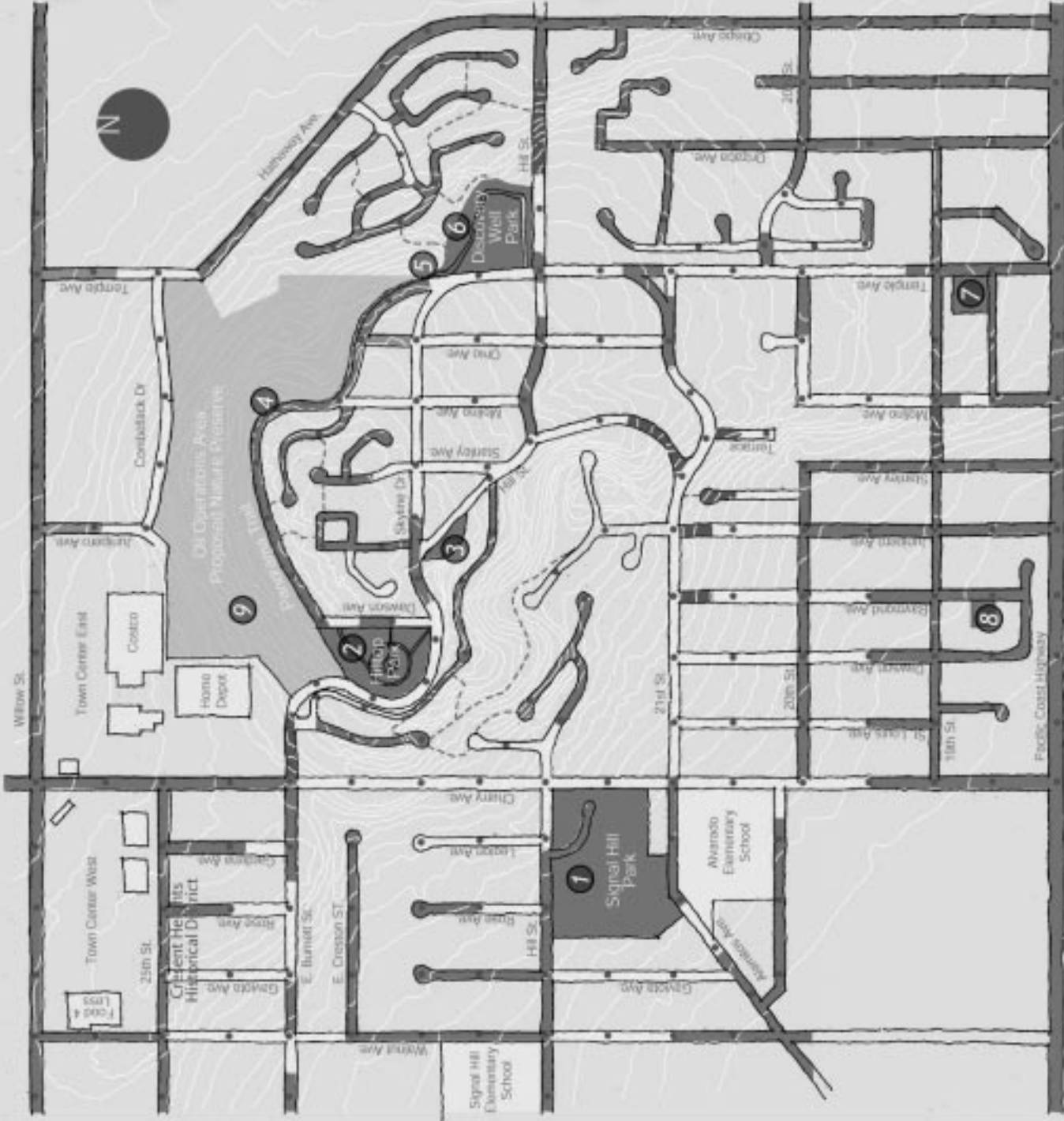
Walkways & Trails
